Meadowside Class News

Reception

We have been continuing on our travels in Reception. Last week we were up in the air in a plane. This week we are afloat on the water and have been imagining what it would be like to go on a boat trip. There have also been lots of experiments going on to investigate what sinks and what floats. We found things around the classroom that would make a good boat.

On Thursday we are visiting the local church. This is our first trip out in Reception. It is very exciting! thank you to all the parent helpers coming with us to make it possible.

During this week we have also been welcoming groups over from Little Meadows. The class have been very friendly, letting these new friends join in with their play. This year has gone by so fast.

Year 1

Year 1 have been excited to reach our final level and become knights this week! In preparation, we have been researching and writing reports all about knights so anyone thinking of becoming a knight can find out what life as a knight would be like. We have found out about their training, their responsibilities, their clothes and weaponry, the food they eat and what other people thought of them. Some of us have decided we aren't cut out for the hard work of knight life, while others of us are ready to sign up! In maths, we have been learning multiplication and division over the last 2 weeks and are now beginning to learn a little more about money by recognising UK coins. These are great skills to work on at home too. Don't forget our trip to Warwick Castle is happening next week! We are very excited, and it should be a brilliant experience for the children. Class News Continued

Year 2

Year 2 really enjoyed their stitching experience and we came to realise just how talented those women were back in the Medieval times as they managed to create such amazing pictures. We found stitching a very tricky challenge- it took us all morning (and some of the afternoon) to get just our border completed!! We have only one more week before our trip to Warwick Castle so we have nearly learnt enough to become knights ourselves!!

In English we have been using the story The Adventures of Egg Box Dragon and practising our formal language/ tone to help us sound like 1950s news broadcasters. We noticed how very differently people spoke back then- we all thought they sounded very posh!!

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In maths, we have been thinking about using all of the skills we have learnt to solve worded problems. We will continue this over the next few weeks and will work hard to improve our flexibility in maths problem solving- choosing the methods we use to solve problems.

We have also begun to discuss the changes that happen in Year 2- changes in our own bodies, including learning the correct scientific names for body parts, and changes in our school- preparing ourselves to move into Key Stage 2. This has generated lots of questions and discussions and we have encouraged children to ask trusted adults about any concerns they have too. We hope the children talk knowledgeably about what they have learnt!

Year 3

Year 3 have continued to investigate plants. We designed and carried out an investigation into what a seed needs to germinate. When we looked at the results we were quite shocked to see the growth of the seeds kept in the dark! We also really enjoyed dissecting a Tulip. We were able to identify the stamen, anther, filament and stigma amongst other parts too! We were amazed at all the different parts of a flower and enjoyed learning about their special jobs. We hope your broad bean plants are growing well and your child has remembered to keep the diary up to date! Unfortunately a few of the seeds kept in school didn't germinate and we have had lots of ideas about what the problems could have been!

We have continued to enjoy sharing 'Charlotte's Web' during whole class reading sessions. We have used this for inspiration in our writing and have written several diary extracts form different character's perspectives. We have spotted a couple of resident arachnids in the corner of the classroom, and they have been named Charlotte and Wilbur! Inspired by this to learn more about spiders, this week we have been busy researching spider's ready to write a non-chronological report.

Year 4

In Year Four, we have started our final book of the year as a stimulus for writing. The author has cleverly interwoven brief vocabulary and detailed illustrations to create a thought provoking picture book; the title will be revealed later in the teaching sequence! We have been reading and converting digital and analogue times in maths; if you can support your child by asking them to tell you the time using an analogue clock face, better still, their own analogue watch, that would be appreciated. Time is an area of maths that many children find difficult, asking a child what the time will be in say 15 minutes is useful or how many hours/ minutes until say 2:00pm when we will go to the Supermarket, provides a context and helpful practice.

On Wednesday afternoon, Year 4 children used oil pastels to create artwork inspired by Georgia O'Keeffe. They loved the activity and there are tutorials on Youtube and you may want to consider buying some for your children to use at home over the summer break.

We have a few Anglo-Saxon activities to conclude as part of our topic and we are looking at plants and their structure as a mini-topic.

Year 5

We have had a great couple of weeks in Year 5. We had an amazing time caving and climbing in the school carpark last week and the children really impressed us with their perseverance and the way they encouraged each other. If you haven't yet seen the pictures on Teams, check them out. In CSI, we have been looking at the results of the 2021 Census and how they impact on planning for the future. We have compared the data with previous census returns and considered our own ideas for our perfect place. We are continuing our work on angles in maths lessons and have become experts at working with protractors.

As part of our Curious Cases topic, we are still enjoying the London Eye Mystery in our English lessons and have used the events in the latest chapters to write restrictive poetry. In art, we have been working on improving our sketching skills and we have also been inspired by Banksy to try our hand at graffiti (but only on paper!)

We are finishing our logo projects in Computing and the children should be incredibly proud of the results. Next week, we are off to Severn Vale for a morning of science experiments and can't wait to use the Bunsen burners!

Year 6

These past two weeks have flown by. It is actually all starting to dawn on us that we have days left now as a pupil of Meadowside. However we all know Beech Class will always be Meadowsiders. Leaver's hoodies are being worn with pride and it is lovely to see everyone's Year Books coming together. We are coming to the end of our last topic and getting our culinary skills ready for action. School production rehearsals are well underway and our dancing feet are preparing for some choreography now. 'Two Left Feet' springs to mind! (Actually one of the songs, but quite apt)!

However, the most important event of the year can now be reported on...the RESIDENTIAL! WOW! We think everyone is just about recovering from the jam packed fun few days. THIS is when children really shine. Friendships blossomed, fears were conquered, joy was witnessed, calories were burnt, plenty of food was eaten and Meadowside memories were made (in abundance). The weather was very kind and the days were glorious sunshine. We hope the children have shared with you some of the things we crammed in and that Facebook kept you in the loop. What are the rewards of being part of FOM

Governors update

Would you or someone you know benefit from the chance to..

- work as part of a leadership team and to learn from others with this experience
- learn new skills; demonstrate expertise; bolster a CV/work history/study application
- supplement trainee, management and education courses with practical experience
- enjoy a wide range of experiences and activities
- make friends; work as a team; share your knowledge and help us build an inclusive school
- interact, talk, laugh and learn with staff and of course, pupils who are always surprising with their insights...?

If any of these ring bells it could be that a governor role has something to offer you and if that sounds like a challenge too far don't let the 'words' put you off.

Whilst you can be 'a' governor you can only operate as one as part of a body/board or, as we like to say, 'team'.

Governors are a team of people working together to cover school leadership and support the whole school community in being the best it can be. The team work is important giving governors shared responsibility and shared accountability so that decisions are made as a group of school representatives and not by individual governors or teachers.

If you know someone who could be interested, we have identified some particular areas that it would be good for new governors to have enthusiasm about as an existing or, as a willing, 'new' expert. As well as governors linked to curriculum, we need coverage of the more 'business' side of school, our strategy, personnel, health and safety and premises management. Governors do not need to have a child at the school and can be anyone over the age of 18 so this really is an opportunity to share with everyone you know.

We will be soon be adding more detail to our website and making social media posts and we encourage you to spread the word to colleagues, friends and family to help us keep the governor resource strong at Meadowside.
